# **Feb 27 Provincial Election is an Opportunity to Fight for Public Education Funding and Staffing**

As part of our bargaining campaign to secure the necessary investments in public education, CUPE-OSBCU is shining a light on the understaffing crisis in Ontario's public education system.



#### **Key Survey Findings**

Approximately 12,000 CUPE members participated in the services survey, and the results confirm that Ontario's public school system is facing an understaffing crisis.

- 84.1% of members report stress and burnout due to overwork.
- CUPE members are making up for the staffing shortfall by doing over 1300 full-time jobs' worth of unpaid work in schools.
- Members in all classifications (ranging from 70% to 97%, depending on the classification) say student needs are unmet due to understaffing, workers are unable to complete all their tasks daily, and workloads have increased significantly over the last five years.
- 83% of members agree that **more staff are needed** to meet existing needs and improve student support quality.

As CUPE members know from our 2022 bargaining campaign, when workers unite and are prepared for powerful strike action, we can win important gains—even when faced with concessions.

To secure funding and staffing investments for Ontario's students and education workers, we will need to once again prepare for maximum strike readiness. In the meantime, we must seize every opportunity to champion a supportive and inclusive public education system where every student's needs are met.
